Positive Behaviour for Learning at Colvton Public School

At Colyton Public School we use the Positive Behaviour for Learning [PBL] system as a way to deliver and implement behaviour expectations to students, teachers and the community. This is achieved through the use of a common language when both teaching and reinforcing expected behaviours and addressing inappropriate behaviours. Vocabulary is the 'key' to the success of PBL at Colyton Public School starting with our four core expectations: Safe, Responsible, Respectful, Learners.

School Expectations

Safe - Learn and play safely, and be in the right place at the right time. Move sensibly around the school, report unsafe behaviour to a teacher.

Respectful - Respect other people's personal space, use manners and listen to others.

Responsible - Wear school uniform with pride, care for your own and other people's property, be on time, put your rubbish in the bin and report all problems to a teacher.

Learner - Be ready and prepared to do your best at all times by participating and being a team player.

PBL posters identifying the rule of the week are displayed in each classroom. PBL matrix posters display the behaviour expectations of students for areas around the school. A yearly scope and sequence of learning activities for students outlines the teaching schedule of PBL expectations/rules.









PBL Tokens

PBL tokens are used as an immediate reward and are given to students who follow the school expectations. When students receive a token they are to write their name on the back of it and place it in the class token box.

Teachers will draw one token every fortnight (weeks 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10) on a Thursday before lunch. The winners will be notified by teachers at the end of lunch and go to lawn area near the office to receive a reward. Teachers are required to empty their token box after 3pm on the Friday of the draw.

Colyton Champions Reward System

At Colyton Public School students have the opportunity to collect and submit their awards to achieve a $merit\ award \rightarrow pennant \rightarrow trophy$. Students are responsible for collecting and storing their awards and for taking them to the appropriate teacher who will total points towards their next award. Awards will be signed on the back by the appropriate teacher once they have been used for the next award. Awards will be returned to students once they have been counted towards the next award. Awards not signed on the back carry over year to year. Each award is worth points as outlined in the following list.

10 Points = 1 Green Merit Award

4 Green Merit Awards = 1 Green Pennant

4 Green Pennants = Trophy

Green Level

All students begin the year on Green Level - all privileges and representative opportunities are available

Speed Bump

First minor incident - student remains at Green Level

- Minor disruption
- Minor physical contact
- Inappropriate language or actions

Possible consequences:

- Discussing situation with student/s
- Reminding student/s of school rules
- Redirecting student/s to another activity or area, or with other students
- Brief time out with teacher
- Discuss possible solutions to rectify the situation
- Loss of playtime or detention

Management strategies for responding to negative behaviour

If expectations are not being followed and behaviour is inappropriate consequences will be applied in accordance with the appropriate level. The level will be determined by frequency, severity, intention, personal situation and extenuating circumstances, age and maturity.
